The year 2010 is the twentieth anniversary of *Covenant Relationship for a Better World*. In May of 1990 the California-Pacific Annual Conference Board of Global Ministries approved the organization of the entity to promote missionary support throughout the conference. The previous year \$82,744 had been given for missionary support by 64 churches. A goal of \$100,000 from 75 churches was set for 1990. At the end of that year 92 churches had responded with \$122,652.

**Pastors and congregations have continued to respond during the past 20 years.** Our United Methodist missionaries and General Board of Global Ministries express appreciation for your vision and generosity. Cal-Pac missionary figures show how you have increased your interest and your giving:

“Since 2009 we are in Maracaibo, Venezuela, working with the Christian Methodist Community of Venezuela (CMCV). The C M C V has been working here since the 90s in three poor neighborhoods. These communities are blighted with crime and a variety of poverty signs: housing is not enough or is not in good condition, domestic violence and sexual abuse is very common, the use and traffic of drugs is killing many young lives—to survive people usually have to stay quiet. In this environment children, women and young people are very vulnerable.

“How are we fulfilling our mission assignment in this context? Step by step; listening, talking and hugging; being always available and being patient and flexible; praying, studying and always asking God’s Spirit to help us discern what to do; ministering and teaching on the road.”

Luis also meets once a week with a group of 15-20 boys and girls, ages 14 to 21. From a short devotion time and a lot of singing it has grown into a very creative discipleship program and after being “introduced” to Jesus Christ the group is learning the basics of the Bible. Luis prepares games and group dynamics and singing with the “cuatro” (Venezuelan guitar) is a “must”. Eunice is tutoring a member of the Church Board through a Theology course and she facilitates to a group of eight that want to have a more “formal” training. She also prepares literature and presentations. Sustained presence on Sundays at CMCV places (2) and participation in prayer meetings at homes is very important and significant to their ministry.

“A church leader is still surprised because the young ones do not fail to come to the discipleship meetings and to the weekly global health workshops she and her husband prepare and we sometimes complement. We believe these boys and girls really want to know, we understand that they are hungry and thirsty for an alternative for their lives and to have the tools to make their own spiritual decisions. We believe they come also because at the CMCV they feel safe and their self and dignity is respected. And of course, they come because they like to have fun with other boys and girls in a peaceful environment!”

“I am a professor at Kwansei Gakuin University which is a major university with over 20,000 students, and includes an attached junior and senior high school, along with a separate elementary school. It was founded 121 years ago by Methodist missionaries, and still maintains a strong Christian presence. There are ten missionaries from various denominations serving at the university.

“I am serving in the economics department, which is a new field of study for me, having degrees in physics and theology. What they need for me to do is to contribute to the study of ethical and philosophical issues related to economics. My main teaching course, entitled “Introduction to Christianity,” is a required course for all students in our department. The purpose of the class is to give the students a background understanding of how the Christian worldview has impacted particularly western culture and through that the whole world. My approach has been to emphasize the importance of “worldview” in shaping and understanding all aspects of life.

“Yuko (Juji) has been assigned as a medical counselor to the Shin'ai Home in Kobe which is a home for the aged who come from disadvantaged and discriminated against groups. Her presence has greatly improved the atmosphere as she mediates residents' complaints and grievances.”

Rev. Boyle first served in Japan as a lay missionary from 1971-74 in Sapporo on the northern island of Hokkaido. After seminary and a four-year pastorate in California, the Boyles returned to Hokkaido for a term and then moved to Tsukuba Science City near Tokyo where they served 21 years prior to this assignment. The Boyles are the parents of two adult daughters, Lisa Megumi and Jennifer Mari.

JFON is a network in mission of the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), annual conferences, congregations, and ecumenical partners. Global Ministries initiated JFON in 1999 as a response to increasingly complex immigration regulations in the United States. JFON provides free legal clinics for immigrants seeking counsel to solve immigration issues.

Born in Lawton, Oklahoma, Stephen attended the University of Central Arkansas and earned a B.A. degree in History. His theological study was completed at Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas. In addition, he earned a law degree at the Little Rock School of Law of the University of Arkansas.

In addition, Stephen is extremely active in civic life in Little Rock and Arkansas, serving in multiple capacities with organizations devoted to such causes as hunger alleviation, human rights, economic security and a living wage, shelter for the homeless, and social justice. The Jaycees honored him with an Outstanding Young Arkansan award, one of several honors he has received for his social and humanitarian work.

“We are heartened by the fact that the Cambodia Methodist Bible School has received over twenty

new applicants for admission to its program this year. A total of seven of the applicants happen to come from the two districts I superintend. There is a great amount of excitement in my districts and in the other districts over this hope-filled news.

“I will continue serving as the Country Director for the United Methodist Mission, which is one of four agencies working to bring about one Methodist Church in Cambodia. The other agencies are the Korean Methodist Mission, the Methodist Mission in Singapore, and the World Federation of Chinese Methodist Churches. In Cambodia, the United Methodist Mission has two agency participants: the General Board of Global Ministries (GBGM) and Connexio, which is the Board of Missions of the United Methodist Church in Switzerland and France. As Country Director, there are eight colleague GBGM missionaries in my administration.

At the moment, our partnership with the other agencies covers all dimensions of the mission: Christian education; ministry among women, men, youth and children, including street children; leadership training and continuing education of pastors and lay people; vocational training for youth; health, agriculture and community development; evangelization and church growth; the construction of new church facilities; education—i.e., primary all the way to secondary education; orphanage ministry; and vocational training for women.

“I will continue to teach at the Cambodia Methodist Bible School. This past school year, I taught classes in Church History, Systematic Theology, and Ecumenics and Mission. I also serve as chairperson of the Theological Education Committee, which has supervision over the Bible School and conducts the continuing training and education of our pastors and lay people. I have agreed to continue in this role for the coming year beginning in August. I am also the chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry.”

There are many issues related to abuse of alcohol: loss of the Alaskan Native Culture, sexual abuse as well as the high cost of living. Community United Methodist Church seeks to convey God's love through innovative programs such as Tuesday School (Sunday School and Vacation Bible School all rolled into one!), worship that is sensitive to the needs of all people, and through planned programs including establishing a *Celebrate Recovery*® ministry and a planned Faith and Culture Camp where youth can learn one can be both Christian and Alaskan Native.

David is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a Degree in Civil Engineering. He served as Water and Sewer Reconstruction Manager for the U.S. Agency for International Development helping restore water and sewer services to the people of Iraq after the U.S. invasion of 2003. Villagers choose the development tools and training that will best fit their needs." She also organizes leadership training events in Christian Education in the Southeast Annual Conference of the Methodist Church of Mexico.

Terry Henderson coordinates training events offered at the program's 'Tree of Life' Training Center. The Rev. Paul Jeffrey writes about the work of the church around the world as senior correspondent for Response. Paul also provides coverage of emergencies for the ACT Alliance, a Geneva-based global alliance of churches and church agencies responding to disasters.

Paul has filed stories from more than 65 countries in Latin America, the Caribbean, Africa, and Asia, writing about everything from hurricanes to health care, from massacres to indigenous rights, from refugees to ecumenism. In the course of his work, Paul has been trapped in combat, tear-gassed and shot at, taken prisoner by soldiers, and gotten sick from what he calls "every intestinal disorder known to modern science." He's also had what he terms the "privilege of witnessing the poor become subjects of their own history rather than the objects of someone else's history. I often write about what people of faith are doing to empower people at the margins to live the abundant life that's promised to them in the Gospel. I focus on why they're doing that and what the consequences of that work may be for ordinary women and men in the pews," says Paul. "When I do that well, people in the global north begin to understand how we are intrinsically linked to our sisters and brothers in the global south, not just because they share the same Gospel, but also because they share an international economic system that manufactures poverty and injustice for the majority."

Paul's writing also appears in magazines such as the Christian Century and the National Catholic Reporter, and his photos have been used in publications from the Washington Post to the National Geographic Explorer. Paul is the author of "Recovering Memory," a book about the role of churches in the Guatemalan peace process, and co-author of "Where Mercy Fails," a critical look at genocide in Darfur. Paul has won several awards for his work, including the top annual photography award of the United Methodist Association of Communicators (eleven times), the top annual writing award of the same association (nine times). Four times he has won the Eileen Egan Award for Journalistic Excellence from Catholic Relief Services. He has received the top annual magazine photography award of the Associated Church Press, as well as awards for the best international news writing and the best photo story from the Catholic Press Association.

Before his current assignment, Paul and his wife, the Rev. Dr. Lyda Pierce, served as missionaries in Nicaragua, Guatemala, and Honduras. Lyda is currently serving as missionary for the development of Hispanic and Latino ministries in the Pacific Northwest Conference. Paul and Lyda have two children, Lucas and Abigail.

### **LIBERIA**

“It’s official... I have passed all 3 exams for pediatric surgeons. I am now a board certified Pediatric Surgeon. Praise be to God! I thank you for your love and support to the mission. This is the 1st prayer bulletin as I start my service in Liberia. Although I was on study leave I continued sending my prayer bulletin to friends and covenant churches. This is electronically distributed from the office of missionary Letters in the U.S., and is called **Dok Elma's e-musing**. I try to send these prayer bulletins every month, and on extreme emergency I send out emergency prayer requests for my patients.

“I am serving in Ganta United Methodist Hospital as a general surgeon. Although I am a Pediatric surgeon, I will do all range of operations as long as our resources allows us. A supporting church gifted me with big money and I have bought reference books which are not available there. There are none, I was told, since the hospital was looted and burned down when Charles Taylor was still in power. It was only rebuilt and re-opened in 2005. I am told also to bring my own scrubs and gloves. I was trying to bargain on a cheaper kind of sterile surgical gloves. Then I remembered the HIV issue in Africa. HIV: I am terrified! That was an illumination moment—I mean, why would I compromise my safety because of cost when a church has given me money? Thank God for inspiration—I am bringing 100 pairs of high grade, thicker (orthopedic), costly surgical gloves. It may just be at least 90 operations but by the time it’s used up I’ll be able to scout for another supply source from there. Or I’ll just double-gloves myself. I also was gifted by my optometrist with hoards of protective eyewear for wearing during ORs. And reading glasses too. God is so generous!”

Prior to advanced studies in the Philippines, Dr. Jocson served three years in Nepal at Tansen Hospital.

### **LIBERIA**

The BFC Rescue Center is God’s call to “care for the downtrodden... feed the hungry; heal the sick”... comfort the broken hearted”.

“At the BFC Rescue Center, we have children from different social backgrounds: ex-combatant children; street kids who were roaming the streets and night clubs; orphans and abandoned kids from polygamous families; and destitute children—victims of abuses.

“It is God’s loving hand reaching out to the poor, marginalized and destitute children in the Liberian society, especially those who were taught to kill and to murder; kids who were fed drugs to make them brave enough to fight the war; girls and boys who were abused and abusers. Victims and perpetrators are gathered in God’s Love in this center to experience God’s forgiving and reconciling love.

“I have developed four programs targeting different categories of children and youth. The ministry I am involved in is with war affected children; programs catering to ex-combatant (child soldiers) children and youth who were fed drugs; former internally displaced children and youth who have become street kids with little education; teen mothers in the rural areas victims of cultural beliefs; girls, subjected by fighters to abuses during the war, turned to clandestine activities. I nurture through literacy, numeracy and feeding programs and I solicit scholarships to send them to academic levels.”

Frido was born at the Kintobongo Catholic Mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo. He holds degrees in Psycho-Pedagogy/Language and French Literature (1997), Psycho-Pedagogy/French and African Linguistics (1988) and a Diploma in General Pedagogy (1983). All were awarded in the Democratic Republic of Congo. Frido and his wife, Betty, have a daughter, Josiane.

**Gary Locklear** is currently assigned to the North Carolina Annual Conference in the Rockingham District, working with the Native American Cooperative Ministry. Approximately 90% of Gary's ministry is with Native Americans along with Anglo and African Americans. His focus is in the area of leadership development and church growth with the 12 congregations of Native Americans in the North Carolina Conference. He is active with youth vocation exploration, food distribution, and mission projects within the co-op churches and also abroad. Under his guidance the co-op has worked on a four-year church renovation and on many home renovation projects.

Reflecting on how he knew God was moving through the ministry to which he has been called, Gary shares: "In 1996 I was asked to participate in a mission experience to Bolivia, South America. I agreed and that started my many mission experiences. In Bolivia, I struggled with the elements, food, and accommodations, but understood that God was in charge. My team has done many local projects (especially roofs and dry wall) in this community as well as abroad. I tell my friends that it is possible to 'meet God on the roof'."

Mr. Locklear was born in North Carolina and attended the University of North Carolina, earning a B.S. degree in Health and Physical Education in 1970. He worked from 1973 to 2000 for Libbey Owens Ford Glass as the training director and taught in the Robeson County Public Schools from 1970 to 1973.

## **THAILAND**

The Moons are assigned to establish and direct a facility for orphaned children in Chonburi Province, Thailand. He is a chiropractor by profession.

United Methodist mission work in Thailand is relatively new and is part of the Southeast Asia Mission Initiative. Chonburi Province, south of Bangkok, includes popular tourist spots, including areas known as havens of the sex trade. There are many HIV/AIDS children in the region lacking homes and proper care. The orphanage should be operational by the spring of 2010; it will start small.

"I am thrilled to announce the opening of GBGM Mission Center in northern Thailand! The mission center will be used as headquarters for GBGM northern Thailand ministries and an educational center for local Thais to learn subjects such as English, computer programming and even baking cookies and breads! It will also serve as a hub for Thai university students to gather and fellowship and an AIDS ministry office. We are also envisioning the Center as a place to train local pastors. The building will also house Chiang Mai United Methodist Church (the first UMC in the province)."

The couple spent seven years in preparation for mission service after experiencing a call during a training program offered in Los Angeles by a Korea-based organization. Cindy traces her strong Christian faith to a time in the 1990s when she was having a difficult time in multiple respects. "Someone recommended that I read the Bible, which I did. I met Jesus and experienced the Holy Spirit from reading the Bible," she recalls.

Since her arrival to Mongolia in 2002, Helen's goals have undergone frequent change. Initially, establishing a BGM presence by obtaining property for the first mission center was a major task. Now, as a nurse, directing the Grace Hospice home care program and building relationships are her main functions. Plans for expansion of the hospice program have changed not only due to financial constraints, but also due to the need for focusing on improvement of the quality of care and the depth of faith of the staff working in hospice. Leadership development is also a main concern for future management of the program.

"It is especially important to some people here because this year marks the tenth anniversary of palliative care education and hospice/palliative care in Mongolia.

"One of the things I recently learned is that people are thinking that "hospice" is only a PLACE and not a "concept of care." The result is that the places called "hospice" have long waiting lists and we could take a few more patients. We refer our home patients to the hospices with facilities when a patient needs 24 hour care, but otherwise think home care is the best option for most individuals with short life expectancies.

"Mission Teams are needed for 2011 to make playgrounds for the two centers in Ulaanbaatar. Also, we would like to build a shelter from the sun, which means two long tables with benches, plus a roof-like cover. We already have such a shelter at Tsaiz Center and it is used very often for Bible studies and other gatherings. Currently we are raising awareness of such a need, getting material estimates, and corresponding with possible members of a VIM team."

A native of Ann Arbor, MI, Helen holds a diploma in nursing from Bronson Methodist Hospital School of Nursing in Kalamazoo, MI; a B.A. in Psychology from Park College in Parkville, MO; and a M.S. in Social Gerontology from Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg, MO.

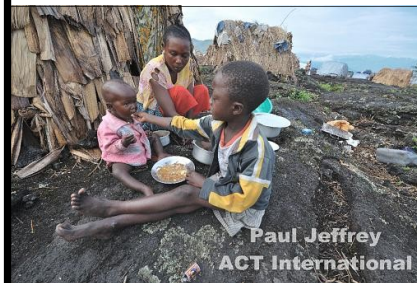
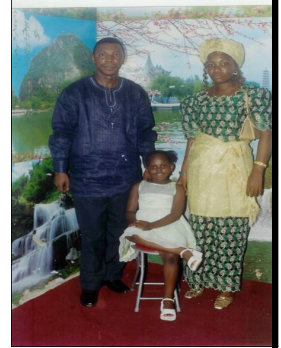

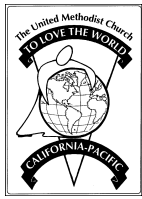
